Jonathan Kingdon at Ninety

Jonathan Kingdon has spent his lifetime looking at the world around him from two rich perspectives. As an artist he is moved and stimulated by the natural world and compelled to explore its colours, patterns, structures and forms through pencil, brush, paint and clay. As a scientist he studies and explores animals and birds with scalpel and microscope whilst he observes and scrutinises their behaviour; he records their relationship to one another and their place in our world – this duality brings the artist's sensibilities to his science and the scientist's inquisitiveness to his art.

Focusing solely on one aspect of Kingdon's enormous output, 'Nature Decoded' explores the way in which drawing is for Kingdon, a way of looking at the natural world and sculpture; a means of expressing ideas generated by such penetrating scrutiny. The exhibition encompasses a whole spectrum of works from shorthand sketches executed swiftly in the field through to refined and precise anatomical studies. This includes detailed, patient enquiry leading to thoughtful expressive sculptures which celebrate the rhythms of biological structures: bones and skulls, feather and skin which are not only formed for the functions they have evidently evolved to perform but are also intrinsically beautiful. Chosen by eyes and sensibilities much like our own, in which beauty itself is selected for by generations, furthering their offsprings chances of survival in becoming more attractive to the opposite sex. This taste for the beautiful in conjunction with the environmental forces of natural selection have produced the world's incredible diversity of animals and birds that Kingdon revels in with abundantly obvious delight.

We very much hope that this exhibition throws new light into Kingdon's world and illustrates his mimetic skills of drawing from nature, through the imaginative process of elaborating selected elements of those drawings, to the organised arrangements of sculptural form, Kingdon treads his own evolutionary path and reveals insights that only an Artist-Scientist could expose. This particular blend of disciplines gives Jonathan Kingdon his very own expressive language.






"At its simplest, this sculpture resembles an ovoid, pod-like composition opened up to hint at countless potentials within single cells, eggs or seeds.

This mostly microscopic subject retrieves "scale" from some of my many sculptural forebears. Prehistoric carvers represented mothers suckling one or two infants. I have reconfigured such Paleolithic representations of butt, breast and baby into an enlarged, firmly balanced, two-chambered "shared heart" above which evermore-complex forms bubble out. In its final, monumental form, this piece is dedicated to the intellectual discipline and practice of evolutionary biology."





"The bronze sculpture I am offering could elicit several potential titles. Among them, "Origins" or "Mammalian Madonna" might hint at the role I have in mind, however, I made this piece with the following concepts in mind.

At its simplest, this sculpture resembles an ovoid, seed-like form opened up to reveal, or hint at the countless potentials within a single cell, seed, egg, sperm or blastula.

I have "humanized" and enlarged this (mostly microscopic) subject by borrowing certain elements from prehistoric carvings of a seated female figure suckling one or two infants.

I have reconfigured these ancient representations so that the Palaeolithic artists' conception of knees, lap and seated buttocks under babes and bulbous breasts becomes a firmly balanced, two-chambered, heart-like base for the still seed-like, pod-like, womb-like composition above it.

Here, actively differentiating, ever more complex forms bubble out above the "shared-heart" form below.

Linking to the base by an umbilicus-like cord are a tightly integrated set of forms that can be read as foetus, nurseling, breast, even foetal "peas in a pod".

Resembling a sort of spill-over from egg, womb or shell, all these elements shelter under an "umbrella" that serves to contain or seal the complex of forms below, (or within) it.

This arch can be reminiscent of some vestigial. abraded Palaeolithic mother's head or, more simply, serve to cap or contain the complexities within the imaginary membranes and potentialities that this bronze artefact infers.

I am offering this sculpture to celebrate and make manifest a redefinition of our established mission and achievements in leading education and research within our disciplines, within our University and within the larger world beyond."
